Subject	What are students learning in lessons?	What could students do to extend their learning and develop their character?
Autumn Term 1	Non-Fiction persuasive speech writing: The Salem Witch Trials. The Crucible: exploring the play and understanding the life of Arthur Miller.	Be curious: research the life of Arthur Miller. Be resilient: develop literacy through deeper meaningful reading.
Autumn Term 2	The Crucible continued: exploration of characterisation and themes throughout the play. Creating links to the 1950's McCarthy era and The Salem Witch Trials in 1692.	Be curious: research the 1950's American McCarthy era and The 1962 Salem Witch Trials. Be independent: revise the play and key quotations.
Spring Term 1	Shakespearean Tragedy: Romeo and Juliet: an exploration and analysis of character, themes, historical, cultural and social context linked to Shakespeare's intentions and impact.	Be curious: explore the Elizabethan era. Develop your understanding of life for men and women during Shakespeare's era.
Spring Term 2	Gothic Fiction: exploring and analysing short gothic stories and extracts. Analysing characterisation and authorial intentions. Exploring gothic conventions and their impact on the reader.	Be curious: explore the world of Gothic Fiction. Explore writers both classic and modern. Develop your literacy through reading Gothic Fiction.
Summer Term 1	Detective Fiction - Sherlock Holmes and The Speckled Band: characterisation and thematic exploration across the text. Non-Fiction writing: Speeches, Letters and Articles. Developing writing skills using methods for effect.	Be explorative: watch/listen to key speeches across history. Be independent: revise key characters and quotes.
Summer Term 2	Non-Fiction, Poetry and Creative writing unit: exploring themes such as Poverty and the Family, Power and Conflict and Identity and Culture through a diverse range of writers, poets and non-fiction texts.	Be creative and produce your own piece of non-fiction, poetry or creative writing based on these themes.
